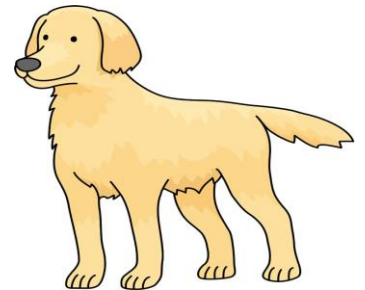
We have recently welcomed Jasper, a guide dog resident, to Carondelet Village.

INFORMATION REGARDING GUIDE DOGS

- A dog wearing a harness with a handle is a guide dog, and is at work helping its blind partner travel safely.
- Please keep your pet away.
- Always ask before attempting to interact with a guide dog.
- By law, obstructing a working guide dog can result in up to \$50,000 in fines.
- If you are a witness to an attack on a guide dog team, you can assist by noting the description and location of the attacking dog.

Please do your part to protect working guide dogs for the blind.

PET OWNERS, PLEASE NOTE

If your pet is overly friendly (or aggressive) and jumps on people or other dogs, that behavior could cause permanent trauma or injury to a guide dog.

An attack on a guide dog can be costly in terms of veterinary care, retraining, replacement, emotional trauma and loss of mobility for the blind person.

Please don't take chances with others' safety.
